Pearl,... such a befitting name for this lovely mare. A pearl is created when an irritant enters an oyster's shell then slowly layer upon layer of shimmering, protective nacre is laid around the irritant until a precious treasure is created.

Pearl's previous owner had been duped into accepting the emaciated mare and after several months of struggling to help her she put out a plea for help which we answered. Days from death, Pearl arrived at the sanctuary around I am after a 3-hour round trip to South Carolina. In addition to being starved to the brink of death, she has lost use of her right eye, has an old chest injury with broken ribs and a damaged hip. At Midnight's Promise her journey to recovery officially began and we faced many

challenges as we gave her around the clock care for starvation and dehydration. It has now been about 11 weeks since she has been under our care. She has gained more than 50% of the weight she needs, is eating hay like a normal horse, and showing more of her personality and unwavering will to survive. Her future is promising.

It has been a long time since I posted an entry. Ladybird, my own rescue pony, has settled into a routine and the quiet rhythm of daily barn life has superseded the high emotion of the weeks following her rescue, Strangles diagnosis, and months of treatment. During those first few weeks I posted about Nigel, a Standardbred gelding dumped by the Amish at a nearby feedlot. He was homely, malnourished, and bound for slaughter until his Wonka bar magically revealed a Golden Ticket in the form of Deb Baker, Cindy Slate, and the other angels of Midnight's Promise Equine Rescue. I had seen "Nigel" on Facebook (Tarheel Feedlot has since taken to more inspired "marketing practices" by naming their horses after whimsical and popular movie & TV characters such as "Elrond" and "Frodo", but back then they just named every horse in the week's lot of future puppy chow with an impersonal moniker beginning with that week's letter.), and if you read that particular entry in this blog then you know how anguished I felt over his looming fate and how gloriously jubilant I was when I found out he had been saved. But even after he was saved, he still had a rough road to health. Months of expensive and laborious vet care and slow and careful dietary changes were required. It is truly a delicate balance to nurse a horse back to health. Feed a starving man a rich meal and he is likely to vomit on you. Feed a starving horse too rich a diet too soon and you might kill him by accident! But Nigel (temporarily dubbed "Friday" because he was saved the Friday after Thanksgiving) was in expert hands with Midnight's Promise.

How We Do It

People often ask where we get money to do what we do. Right now, the answer is very simple: a collection of donations from people who believe in us and what we are doing: family, friends, fellow horse and animal lovers. We are supported entirely through fund raising efforts and public donations, not grants or government support. We have a small group of loyal, steady volunteers who give their time to make sure we are doing our best to make a better life for horses in need.

Most of us work several shifts a week. We have no paid employees. We run a shoestring budget and attempt to waste as little as possible so that every dollar is well spent and goes directly to care for the horses. So if you worry that a donation of \$10-20 doesn't have enough impact to change things, please know those donations are an important piece of how we keep the mission alive.

Depending upon the health and needs of the herd, our operating costs vary between \$1500 and \$2000 a month. Truthfully, we wonder every month how we'll raise enough money but some how we always pull through. Every donation, no matter how small, is appreciated and brings us one step closer so if we haven't said it already.....
